Qualitative analysis of Criterion 1

A J Institute of Management, affiliated to Mangalore University, has been delivering quality Management Education for the past 25 years. There is a balanced approach in pedagogy including both curriculum and beyond-curriculum activities, as reflected in the Teaching-Learning Practices (TLP) framework. Curriculum delivery is done with proper planning complemented by the utilization of ICT resources within a well-coordinated academic schedule aligned with the University's calendar. Teaching methods comprised various dimensions such as lectures, case analysis, group discussions, seminars, workshops, computer lab exercises, internships, and project work. Effective curriculum planning and delivery are ensured by using tools such as Student Progress Tracker, Course File, Assessment Rubrics, Project Work Diary etc., as reflected in TLP. Students undergo a range of internal assessments as part of CIE, including tests, assignments, presentations, book reviews, viva voce sessions, and attendance aligned with the calendar of events. Effective curriculum planning, implementation, and delivery are reflected in an average pass percentage of 96.82% along with 5 ranks and 4 gold medals at the University level.

The Institute has offered 41 add-on courses beyond the curriculum with due collaboration with the neighboring business houses/entrepreneurs across diverse fields of expertise benefiting the students during the assessment period.

The Institute focusses on cross-cutting issues such as Professional Ethics, Gender Sensitivity, Human Values, Environmental Awareness, and Sustainability in both its curriculum and beyond curricular practices. This integration is evident through 33 modules in 34 courses and 50 events including conferences, workshops, seminars, expert lectures, commemorative events, and community development initiatives. The feedback system in the institution is in place.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 2

Institute has an enrollment rate of 98.69% over the last five years. The academic performance of students is good with 96.82% pass percentage over the last five years. This achievement has resulted in the attainment of five ranks, including two first ranks accompanied by four gold medals bestowed by the University. The student-teacher ratio is approx. 19:1. There are sixteen faculty members in totality out of which eight faculty members hold Ph.D. degrees, the remaining six are NET-Qualified and four pursuing Ph.D.

The teaching pedagogies include experiential and participative learning, as well as problem-solving methodologies, encompassing activities such as group discussions, case analysis, computer lab exercises, internships, project work, seminars/expert lectures, workshops, management fest, conferences, field surveys, outreach programs, club activities, inspirational movie presentation, and short movie preparations.

The institute aligns with University regulations for internal and external assessments. Internal assessment, carrying a weightage of thirty marks, includes 360-degree evaluations comprising two tests, presentation/book review, assignment, viva-voce, and attendance, ensuring transparency supported by an efficient redressal system. While, external assessment, accounting for 70 marks is administered by the University through semester-end examinations. The institute clearly defines and showcases Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes with direct and indirect assessment methods ensuring meaningful learning outcomes in tune with Bloom's taxonomy to support holistic learning. The attainment of PO is calculated and visible.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 3

The institute has registered Innovation Institution Council (IIC) and Entrepreneurship Development Cell. A total of 46 academic events, including seminars and demonstrations, are conducted under these initiatives.

The Institute has been granted recognition as a Research Centre by Mangalore University to supervises Ph.D. programme in Management. The Institute publishes a peer-reviewed Bi-annual Journal-*Anveshana*, with proper registration and with ISSN number. The Institute conducted household social surveys and extension activities in 5 adopted villages and the Government of India has released Rs. 50,000 as a grant for this purpose.

Faculty have also authored papers in peer-reviewed Journals. However, the number does not align with the number of faculty members, their tenure in the institute, and also the 25-year standing of the institute. It means that the faculty members need to focus more on research outcomes to remain competitive in the light of NEP-2020.

The institute has also organized 30 events comprising yoga, mental health, ethics, and life skills in support of the Indian Knowledge System during the assessment period. Further, the Institute also organized workshops, seminars, national conferences, and international E-Symposium on the themes of Research, IPR and Entrepreneurship. The institute also organized 36 extension and outreach activities including collaborative programmes with Young India, JCI, Productivity Council etc. and facilitated student-community interactions, fostering community-based partnerships, a sense of social consciousness and sensitivity as well tolerance towards social causes and social values. Further, the Institute has earned 14 recognitions from Government and government-recognized bodies for its community development endeavors, 23 Memorandums of Understanding are in place with various organizations, facilitating opportunities such as student internships, on-the-job training, projects, extension, and cultural collaborations.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 4

The institute has state-of-the-art infrastructural facilities with adequate infrastructure with eight modern classrooms and one multi-purpose room, all equipped with essential amenities including CCTV cameras, projectors, AV systems, computers, and air-conditioning. There is one air-conditioned auditorium with audio-visual facilities with a seating capacity of 380 students.

The institute possesses a few classical instruments for cultural activities and indoor gaming facilities. For sustainability Institute has vermicomposting, and rainwater harvesting facilities, STP with capacity of 2000 liters and also an e-waste mechanism with an MOU with an external agency. Other amenities comprise independent faculty cubicles, first aid-equipped restrooms, sanitary napkin vending machines, a 100-seater canteen, stationery services, lift access, 125 KV generator, in-campus girl's hostel. There are 39 CCTV cameras installed in the campus.

The institute has a library with 16,065 books, 4,555 e-books, and access to E-journals such as DELNET, NDL and EBSCO, though it is not air-conditioned and partially automated. It is equipped with 10 desktops, 100 Mbps leased line internet, Wi-Fi and EasyLib software. It maintains a healthy student-computer ratio of 4:1. Further, Language and Business Lab connected via LAN with 14 systems. Institute has 110 operating systems software and 182 application software.

<p>As verified from the books of accounts, during the assessment period, the total scholarship amount sanctioned by the Government and Institute is Rs. 4,52,51,389 accounting for 72.44% of the students, out of which the scholarship amount sanctioned by the Institute is Rs. 3,01,15,000 to 635 students.</p> <p>The institute organized 86 activities focusing on capacity development, encompassing soft skills, language proficiency, communication skills, life skills, entrepreneurship, and tech-trend awareness. All the statutory committees such as Anti-ragging Committee, Internal Complaint Committee, Anti-women Harassment Cell, and Grievance Redressal Committee addressing issues like sexual harassment and ragging are in place. Grievances can also be lodged through the online link available on the Institute's website.</p> <p>The institute facilitated placements for 332 students through on-campus and off-campus interviews in the last five years. During the assessment period, the Institute has earned 162 events accolades by 315 students, spanning individual, team, overall winner, and runner-up championships in University/state/national level fests and competitions. The participation and vigor of the students including the Cultural Programme held in the presence of NAAC Peer Team has been outstanding.</p> <p>The Institute has a registered Alumni Association bearing register number DRDK/SOR/115/2023-2024. It prioritizes alumni engagement, utilizing its Alumni Association to foster networking and during the assessment period total alumni contributions are Rs.2,20,303/-. Executive members of the Association actively participate in the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). Alumni contribute their expertise in skill development, placements, and internship opportunities, act as judges for Institute events, participate in outreach programs, and provide curriculum feedback to enrich the educational experience for students. Five MOUs with alumni facilitated Add-on Certificate programmes and internships.</p>

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 6

The Governing Council, Academic Advisory Board and IQAC, along with key functionaries such as Director, Principal, Dean Academics, Student Council Advisor, Research Coordinator, IIC In-charge and staff members collectively ensure the Institute adheres to its Vision and Mission, delivering quality Management Education.

The Institute values 360-degree continuous faculty performance appraisal. The institute provides financial support for conferences, research assistance, flexible leave, and career development programs fostering the career growth of faculty. Faculty have attended 66 conferences/workshops and 27 staff have attended FDP and MDP during assessment period.

The main source of revenue generation is through the collection of tuition fees. Further, the Institute mobilized Rs. 7,79,752 comprising sponsorship for conferences and fests, the amount received for infrastructure use and conduct of programmes under Government of India, Unnat Bharat Abhiyan by GOI, and SPICES by AICTE.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed to Institutional development by fostering various initiatives, however it needs to be strengthened more.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 7

The institute places priority on gender equity in both student admissions and staff appointments. Over the last five years, the Institute has had an average female intake percentage of 57.95% and a female-employee ratio of 53.96%. Nine courses delivered content ensuring gender equity/sensitivity and the Institute ensured equal representation of female students in leadership roles. Reinforcing initiatives such as National Conference on Raja Ram Mohan Roy in fostering gender equality, honouring accomplished women and discussions on gender equity, promoting women's rights and gender equality are organized.

The institute has a sustainable green campus with a Vermi Compost Unit. Ten programmes including Cleanliness Drive -Ek Tareekh, Ek Ghanta, Ek Saath Swachhta Pakhwada - Swachhata Hi Seva 2023 Campaign, Plastic Free Abhiyan, Beach Cleaning, Swachh Campus Abhiyan etc., both on and off-campus were conducted to promote environmental awareness and conservation. Further, a disabled-friendly environment is ensured.

The first best practice, "Nari Sashaktikaran" produced concrete outcomes that enhanced the presence of women in admissions and faculty roles. The second best practice, "Expanding Reach: Connecting Beyond", outreach initiatives including UBA, encouraged student engagement with the community, nurturing collaborative partnerships and fostering social awareness.

The institute's distinctiveness "Pioneering Excellence: Our Signature in Management Fests" has resulted in notable achievements, demonstrated by our student participation in inter-collegiate, state, and national events.

- Programmes on IKS should be organized at regular intervals to facilitate value systems and Happiness amongst the students in the light of the NEP-2020 mandate.
